## 7. Narrative Description

The façade of this building dates to construction work in 1946. The building occupied the three north storefronts of the 1856 three-story Grimes Block. The 208/south storefront provided access to the upper stories, and this section stretched back to the alley. The north 210-212 section was only half-depth on the lot, and this building was partially demolished and rebuilt in 1946 for the Arion Theater and extended to the full depth of the lot. The second story of 208 and front of the building was removed and rebuilt for the current unified façade and overall two story building. The façade is buff brick with three courses of red brick as the main architectural accents. The top line near the top of the parapet stretch across the full width of the building, with the second lines each extending about one-third across the building, and the lower course only about one-sixth across the building from each side. The second story has six one-over-one-light double-hung windows with red brick rowlock sills. Historic photographs show that the first story was configured with the main theater entrance centered on the north two-thirds (210-212) of the building, with two entries into the 208 restaurant and to the upper story at the far right/south. This configuration generally remains with the more recent storefront remodel. The design of the storefront ties into the building to the north at 214-216 N. Main, both owned by Two Rivers Financial Group which also owns the bank on the north corner and drive-in bank on the south corner. The south side of the building is clad in metal siding, covering the brick party wall that was exposed with the demolition of the south half of the Grimes Block in 1962. The city vacated the alley to the bank, provided that they maintain access to the rear of this building and adjacent building. Thus, the rear faces a parking area to the east. The south/208 one-third of the building appears to be part of the rear wall of the Grimes Block, with an entry on the first story and two covered windows on the second story. The brick on the north two-thirds of the rear/east of the building indicates its later 1946 construction, with two entries to the south and one entry to the north on the first story. The second story has a small balcony added, with two added large windows and a smaller double-hung window.

## 8. Narrative Statement of Significance

The Arion Theater appears to contribute historically to the potential Downtown Commercial Historic District. The building was partially rebuilt in 1946 for the Arion Theater at a height of two stories with a new brick façade. The overall building included the Arion Theater at 210 N. Main, a small jewelry store space at 212 N. Main, the Casino Café at 208 N. Main, and the Arion Club on the second story. These businesses were prominent in downtown Burlington through the 1940s and into the 1950s. When the theater was bought out in 1953, the space was renovated for an expanded restaurant, with the Arion Restaurant operating out of this main space and extending into the 208 space with banquet and private dining rooms on the second story. This prominent local business continued to operate here until 1986, and its history contributes to the historic significance of the potential Downtown Commercial Historic District. With the first story remodel and later interior remodel for offices, it is likely that the building does not retain sufficient integrity for individual listing on the National Register of Historic Places, though the interior has not been fully evaluated through this project.

Senator James W. Grimes built a large three-story corner building with six storefronts at 200-212 N. Main Street in 1856, designed by architect Joel Stover. The building was constructed as two 60-foot wide sections, with an opera house on the third story of the south half (*Business Directory and Review of the City of Burlington* 1856: 19). It was known as the Grimes Building and Grimes Hall. A political speech was given by Abraham Lincoln in the new Grimes Hall on October 8, 1858. The south half of the building was torn down in 1962 for the construction of the Burlington Bank & Trust Motor Bank on the south 60' of the block.

Sanborn maps show that a center staircase existed at the junction point of the two halves of the buildings. The north 60-feet of the building consisted of three-story section that extended the full depth (118') of the lot to the alley for the south third (20') of the building, while the north two-thirds (40') extended half the depth at a height of three stories and the remainder at one-story. While the west half of the north 40' was owned by Grimes, the one-story warehouse on the east half was owned by the Norton family. The 1886 Sanborn map shows a saloon and billiards at 208, restaurant at 210, and tailor at 212. The 1892 Sanborn map shows billiards at 208, restaurant at 210, and tailor at 212. The full block from 200-212 N. Main Street is labeled as "Grimes Block." Newspaper references in the 1890s place Arion Hall in the Grimes Block, and the 1894 city directory lists Grimes Opera House at the northeast corner of Main and Valley and Arion Hall at Main and Valley as well. The 1900 Sanborn map shows three stores, and the one-story rear section has been demolished, with the Grimes family then acquiring this part of the lot. Various businesses operated in the three storefronts of 208, 210, and 212. Bacher's French Dry Cleaning was the longest occupant, listed at 212 N. Main from 1916 to 1942. The 1931 Sanborn map shows the same configuration as in 1900 – 208 is three stories for the full depth of the lot back to the alley, while 210 and 212 sit only on the west half of the north 40' of the lot. Stairs continue to be located at the south end of 208, though the corner building (now 200-204) was remodeled for Montgomery Ward in 1929, installing a new brick façade.

In 1936, Arthur Diewold opened a restaurant/bar, The Brown Derby, at 210 N. Main Street. The 1937 city directory lists the Brown Derby Café at 210 N. Main Street, with Bacher's French Dry Cleaning at 212 and 208 vacant. He was raided by the city in 1939 and liquor license revoked, and his brother-in-law Paul Dehn then applied for a liquor license and is listed here in the 1940 city directory (Dick Diewold interview, city directories). Transfer books show that Arthur and Bertha Diewold bought the 208 property in January 1940, and then bought the larger 210-212 property in May 1940. The restaurant/bar then moved to the 208 section. The 1942 city directory lists the Casino Café run by Arthur Diewold and Paul Dehn at 208 N. Main, advertising fine foods, your favorite beer, soft drinks, cigars, and cigarettes. James Waters operated a clothing store in 210 and Bacher's Laundry and Dry Cleaning is listed still at 212. In the 1945 city directory, Casino Café ("for fine foods") was listed at 208 N. Main, with Lawrence E. Miller, chef for Casino Café, listed in the apartment on the second story with his wife Mary. The Ladies' Shop, operated by Jim Waters, was located at 212 N. Main.

In 1946, Arthur Diewold undertook a major construction project to construct a theater on the north 40' of the property. The third story and front of the building were removed, with the new theater building extending the full depth to the alley. The Casino Café continued to operate at 208 through the construction process, with its third story and front removed as part of the project. The current buff brick

façade was then installed, as well as a theater marquee on the 210-212 section (Dick Diewold interview). The Arion Theater opened here in November 1946, and a private supper club known also as the Arion Club opened on the second story on January 1, 1947. The name Arion was from Greek mythology and noted about a doorway in the old building ("History, hospitality on Arion's menu," *Hawk-Eye*, February 23, 1982, 6). Arthur's son Dick (Richard) began working for the family business in 1946, followed by his brother Tom (Thomas) in 1949. The northwest corner of the theater portion had a small store room, roughly 12 by 12 feet, with Arion Jewelers run by Frank Capua listed here in the 1947 city directory. The directory also lists the Casino Café at 208 (Arthur E. Diewold and Paul E. Dehn), Arion Theatre at 210, and Club Arion at 210 ½ N. Main. The Casino Café included a restaurant, bar, and dance hall. Arthur E. Diewold is then listed as the sole owner of Casino Café in the 1951 city directory. The Lions Club is listed with the Arion Club at 210 ½ N. Main. An ad for the Casino Café in the February 1947 issue of the *Railroader* shows the remodeled building with the theater and café.

In 1951, there were five theaters in Burlington: Palace Theater (312-318 N. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, extant), Arion Theatre (210 N. Main, extant), Capitol Theater (211 N. 3<sup>rd</sup> St, extant), Zephyr Theatre (in former Masonic Temple at 420 Jefferson, extant), and Burlington Drive-In Theatre (Agency Rd). Central States Theaters operated the other three downtown theaters as well as the drive-in, with the Arion as the only independent local theater. They bought out the Arion Theater and all their motion picture equipment in early 1953, with the theater then closing on March 7, 1953 ("Arion Theater to be Closed; Restaurant will Occupy Site," *Hawk-Eye*, February 21, 1953, 9). Arthur Diewold then remodeled the theater space into a larger restaurant. The sloping floor was leveled off, and the main kitchen moved from the 208/Casino section into the old theater section. Openings were made in the first story walls to connect the spaces. The Casino Café closed in August 1953, with the full first story then known as the Arion Restaurant. Management then also shifted from Arthur Diewoldt to his sons Dick and Tom (Dick Diewold interview; "History, hospitality on Arion's menu," *Hawk-Eye*, February 23, 1982, 6).

The 1952 Sanborn map shows 208 as a two-story restaurant, with a combined double space for 210-212 extending the full depth of the lot back to the alley. This two-story section includes a note along the front of the building of "from plans." This may refer to interior remodeling, as Dick Diewold indicates construction of the north/theater section in 1946. The ad in February 1947 in *Railroader* also confirms that the façade remodel was complete by that date. Steel posts are indicated between 208 and the combined 210-212. The 1963 Sanborn map then shows a restaurant in both 208 and the combined 210-212, with a small store space in the northwest corner of 212. A marquee is noted as extending out from 210-212.

Newspaper ads in July 1953 cited the "New Arion Restaurant" (*Hawk-Eye*, July 13, 1953, 11). Ads promoted their famous family style chicken dinners, as well as entertainment on the piano and Hammond organ (*Hawk-Eye*, November 5, 1953, 9). Private party and banquet rooms at the Arion Club at 210 ½ N. Main were available for rental for parties, banquets, dances, club meetings, displays, dinner parties, family reunions, etc. (*Hawk-Eye*, December 26, 1953, 8). In September 1953, Moxley's Jewelry in the Arion Building was noted as going out of business (*Hawk-Eye*, September 30, 1953, 6). Ads in 1954 indicate that the Arion Restaurant at 210 N. Main had added "carry out" service. Ads urged people to call to order anything on the menu to pick up and eat in the comfort of your own home

(*Hawk-Eye*, March 3, 1954, 18). The 1955 city directory lists the Arion Restaurant operated by Richard A. and Thomas E. Diewold at 208-210 N. Main, with Willis William, the cook, living in the apartment at 208 ½ N. Main. The small 212 N. Main corner space was occupied by jeweler Royal H. Law. It is then listed as Law's Jewelry in the 1957 city directory.

The 1960 city directory lists the Arion Restaurant at 208-210 N. Main operated by Richard A. and Thomas E. Diewold, with the notes "for fine foods," rooms for private parties, pizza, and carryout services. The Burlington Junior Chamber of Commerce is listed at 208 ½ N. Main. Royal H. Law continued to run Law's Jewelry at 212 N. Main, with diamonds, watches, and clock, watch, and jewelry repairing. In 1963, 212 is listed as vacant, with the Burlington Junior Chamber of Commerce at 210 and the Arion Restaurant at 208-210 N. Main. The Burlington Junior Chamber of Commerce then shifted back to a listing of 208 ½ N. Main, with B&A Coin Center run by R.W. Richardson in the small store space at 212 N. Main Street. Through the 1960s and 1970s, the main restaurant was located on the first story, with a large banquet room and private dining rooms on the second story. Impromptu shows were held on the second story by performers, such as Victor Borge who visited the club after his performance at Memorial Auditorium (Dick Diebold interview; "History, hospitality on Arion's menu," *Hawk-Eye*, February 23, 1982, 6). An article highlighted the history of the Arion in 1982, and Dick Diebold had taken over as chef in the recent years. A number of waitresses had worked at the Arion for over two decades, including Jennie Zahner, Janet Mustard, Betty Siefken, and Dorothy Rive ("History, hospitality on Arion's menu," *Hawk-Eye*, February 23, 1982, 6).

Competition with businesses and restaurants in the western section of Burlington along Roosevelt Avenue hurt many downtown businesses by the 1970s and 1980s. Likewise, the Arion Restaurant saw their business decrease in the 1980s. Dick and Tom Diewold announced in late 1985 that the restaurant was for sale and put it on the market in January 1986. They decided to close the Arion Restaurant at the beginning of March 1986, 50 years after their father had opened the Brown Derby Café ("The Arion falls victim to hard times," *Hawk-Eye*, March 3, 1986, 1). The estate of Bertha Diewold transferred the property to sons Richard and Thomas in April 1990. The Diewolds continued to own the property until 1997. During this period, Dick's son Curt's wife Martha Diewold started Parties Unlimited in the small store room, and then she expanded into the larger first story space after the restaurant closed. She then moved the successful business to Roosevelt Ave, where it has continued to grow (Dick Diewold interview).

In 1997, the Diewold family sold the building to Bruns & Hall, LC. They then sold it to Great River Insurance Company in January 2000. The building then became part of the other Great River Financial Group properties on the block. In 2007, they changed their name to Two Rivers Financial Group. The affiliated Employee Benefit Systems (EBS) also operates here.




