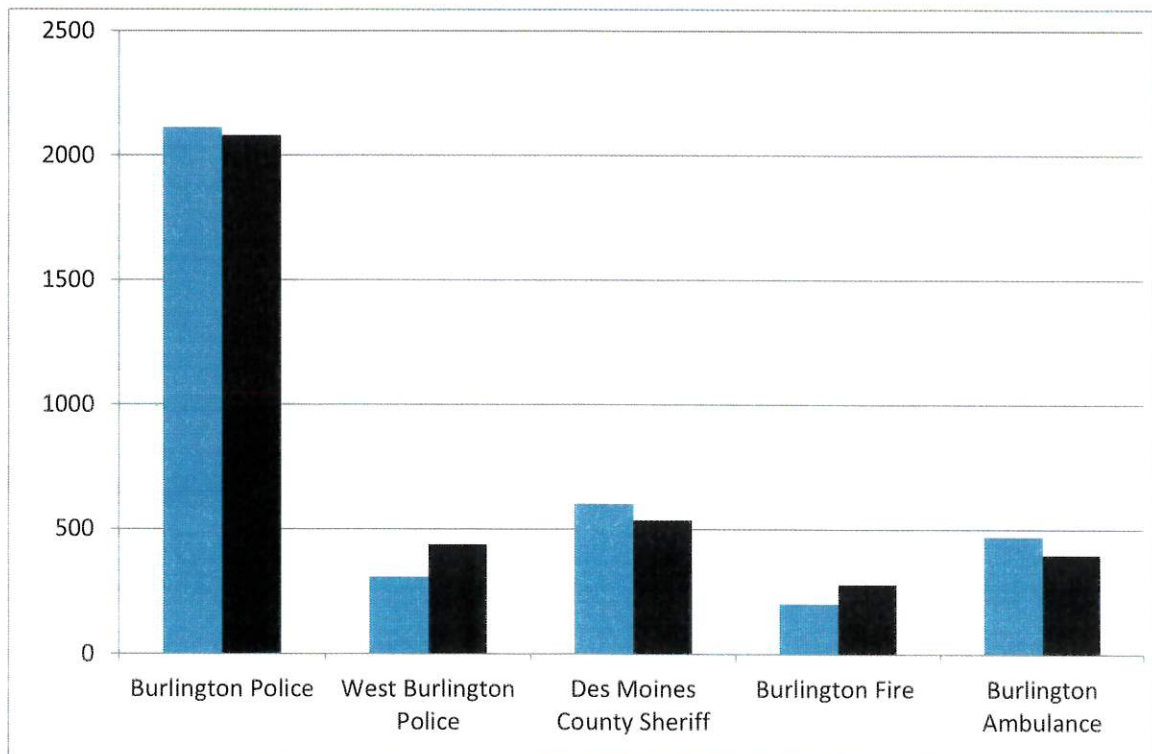
The BPD taught and hosted Active Attacker training for the public as well as hosted Seated Field Sobriety Training for area officers.

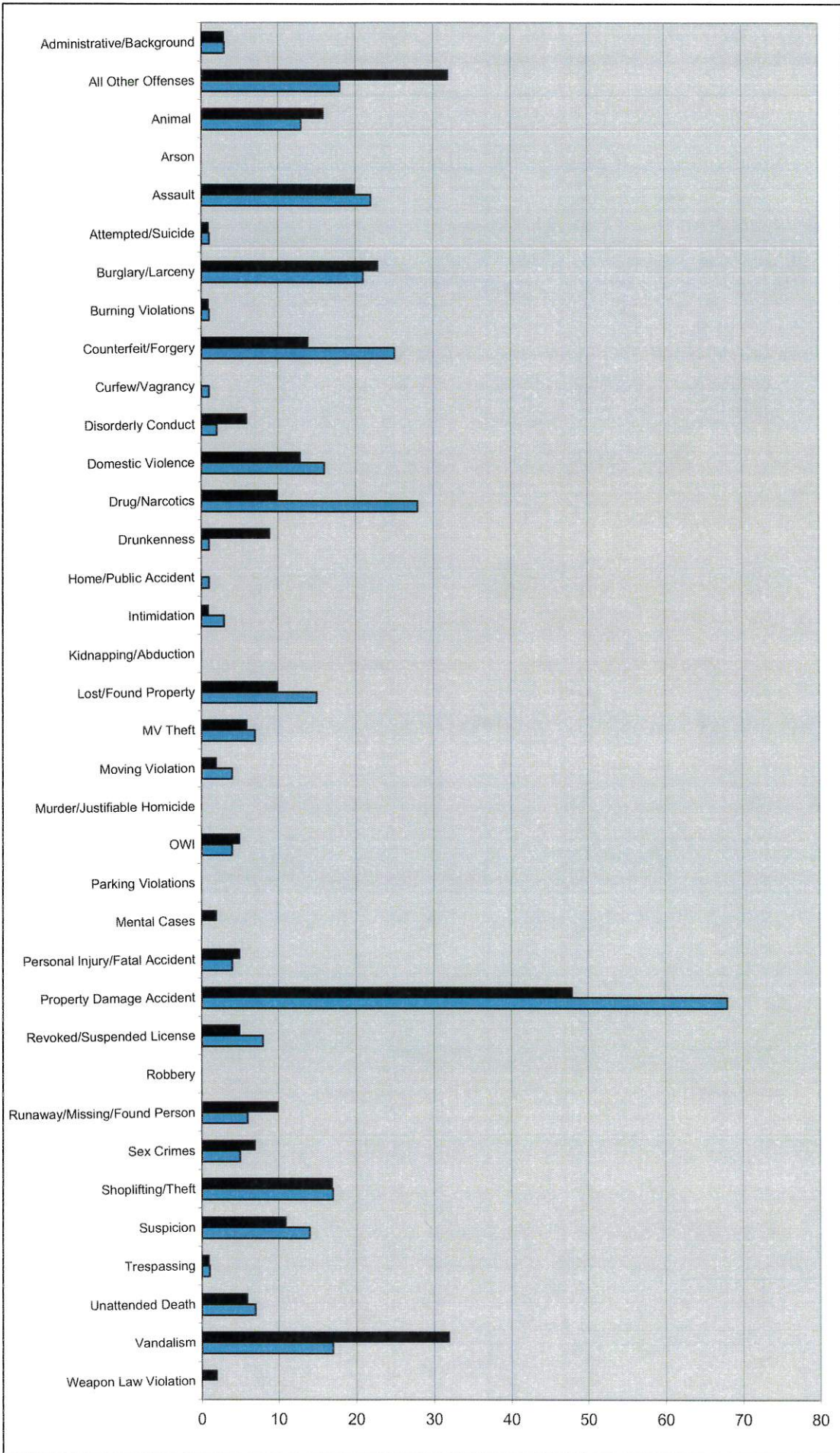

May 2021 vs. May 2020



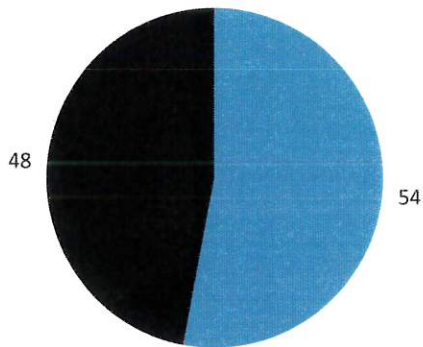

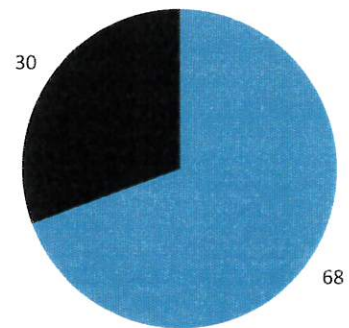


Arrest Types

On-Site Arrests

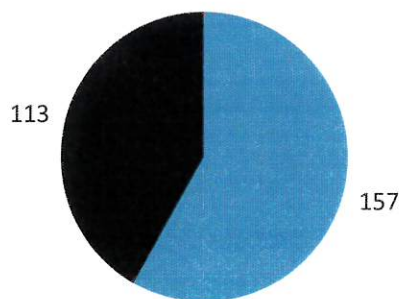


Warrant Arrests

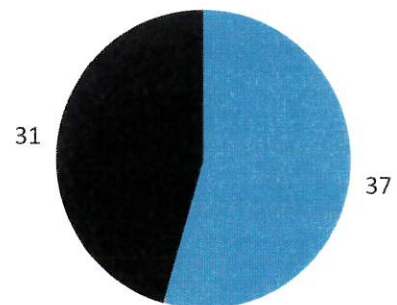


Charge Types

Felony Charges



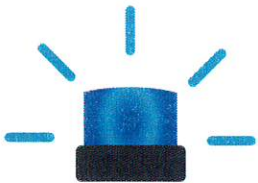
